# The Season of Abrent

St. John the Baptist, dressed in camel's hair and dining on locusts, announced to the people that Jesus, the Messiah, had finally come and now was the time to change their lives. John had the appearance of a wild man rather than an envoy for the King of kings. While some thought John might be the Messiah, he knew clearly that he was only the messenger and Jesus was the promised one:

I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'Make straight the way of the Lord. I baptize with water, but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie.

John's prophetic words ring true and clear as he prepares the way for the true voice of God. John the Baptist only concerns himself with drawing the proper amount of respect from us for the one who comes after him: "He must increase; I must decrease."

When we look carefully at our lives and those of others, we learn what we must change to follow Him. We live in an age of self-importance and by the standards of our appearance-obsessed culture, but our voices can still resonate as clear and effective heralds of God's coming.

Lord Jesus,

Master of both the light and darkness, send your Holy Spirit upon our preparations for Christmas.

We who have so much to do seek quiet spaces to hear your voice each day.

We who are anxious over many things look forward to Your coming among us.

We who are blessed in so many ways long for the complete joy of Your kingdom.
We whose hearts are heavy seek the joy

of Your presence.
