## $\frac{KNOWING\ YOUR\ FAITH}{\text{The Sacrament of Reconciliation or}}$

Penance
When did our Lord institute for us the peace-giving
Sacrament of Reconciliation or Penance?

When our Lord, Jesus, gave to His Apostles and their successors the power to forgive sins, He instituted in His Church the peace-giving Sacrament of Reconciliation or Penance. Thus the faithful who fall into sin after Baptism may be renewed in grace, reconciled with God, and united with the whole Church-community to share fully in all its blessings.

In this Sacrament of Reconciliation we can attain a personal encounter with Jesus Christ Who, through His priest, brings about within us: a) restoration or increase of sanctifying grace, b) peaceful union with Himself, c) forgiveness of our sins, d) remission of the eternal or temporal punishment due to sin, e) helps to avoid sin in the future, f) restoration of the merits of our good works, g) reconciliation with the church-community to share in its many blessings.

Since sin affects the life of the whole Church, not only that of the sinner, a sincere confession also reconciles the penitent to God but to one another as well. By the loving mystery of the divine will, we human beings are joined together by a supernatural solidarity wherein the sin of one person injures all the others just as the holiness of one benefits all the others. Accordingly, Penance always entails a reconciliation with our brothers and sisters in the Church-community without their realizing it.

A real conversion of heart carries with it sorrow for sin together with the firm resolve to lead a better life as expressed to the Church through the priest. We then say or do our assigned penance and try to amend our lives. *Rev. Raymond B. Fullham, S.J.*
